# This was my second time in India representing Australia at the World Championships.

The first was in Mumbai in 2007 when there were only four representatives, but this time there were 14 of us out of 140 competitors. 32 games were played from the 16th to 19th October with the top two finishers to contest a best of seven game final on the 20th.

The trip got off to fairly shaky start with our travelling companion Graeme Lock Lee losing his boarding pass before even leaving Sydney. Later he would give Liz and I the slip at Delhi airport by catching an earlier flight. But a chance meeting with Dylan Early, representing New Zealand, gave us the planned company for the trip from the airport into central Goa.

Goa itself was a destination with a difference. The tourist area of Calangute, North Goa, where we stayed was characterised by narrow streets, lack of footpaths, cattle wandering about, stray dogs and eateries. There were no traffic lights and no high-rise to be seen. The beach sand was golden, but mostly too hot to touch during the day, and shade was something you had to pay for. Luckily we chose a classy hotel, so all that was outside, in stark contrast to the luxuries available to us.

Many scrabblers chose to stay near the venue, being the Peddem Indoor Sports Centre. The rest of us commuted daily by bus some 40 minutes over mostly fairly rough roads. The cheaper accommodation nearer the venue had its downsides, with tales of canceled bookings and water intrusions, with the daily commute being the main downside for the rest of us. The venue too had its problems, with power outages and malfunctioning PA systems, exacerbated by misleading announcements about bus departure times, but overall it was

an excellent, spacious venue, and our Indian hosts did their utmost to keep everyone happy.

As far as my Scrabble went, the less said the better. In one game against Paul Allen from England I got down four consecutive bingos before he triple-tripled with ABDOMINA for 172. I went on to lose by over 100. Ten games later I scored 167 for SLIVERED against Tony Leah of Canada to win by over 100. As for the Australian contingent our best hope Cameron Farlow reached 3rd place on the last day, but then fell to the eventual winner to start a downward spiral which saw him finish 14th. Our best performer was Russell Honeybun who got amongst the prizemoney for his 9th placing.

The best of seven final was contested between Nigel Richards of New Zealand and Jesse Day of USA. After Nigel started well, Jesse fought back to level at 3 games each. The seventh and deciding game was won by Nigel Richards, largely thanks to a crucial triple-triple. In winning that game he deservedly claimed the honour of WESPAC Champion 2019.

### From my point of view - it was wonderful.

The pre-tournament lead-up website and registration were right on the ball many months beforehand which gave everyone ample notice and couldn't have been faulted. The actual running of the games was excellent and the competition was fierce.

The Nigerian contingent are excellent players and very entertaining. The competition did show that Australia may need to have a few more tournaments /opportunities to play according to WESPA rules as some Australian players in the open divisions had difficulty with them and were none too happy. ### Mystery anagram - is a term I use where the related anagram of a word is hidden within the text of my Club Newsletters.

There are different types of anagrams eg. antonym; synonym; they can also be a parody, criticism or satire etc. The antigram is the opposite in meaning to the original word such as; RESTFUL - FLUSTER. The mystery anagram concerns the type where the anagram has a related meaning to the original but not a synonym; such as OCEAN > CANOE; LISTEN > SILENT.

As I can't seem to find a term for this (but maybe a reader can enlighten me), I'll invent one – *kinagram*; where the word bears some relationship (kin) to the original.

OK, the *mystery anagram* this time is a *kinagram*: **XEROTIC** – comes from the word **XEROSIS**, abnormal dryness of bodily tissues, esp. the skin, eyes, or mucous membranes. However, if you look closely at the word & its make-up, you'll find it consists of :- **x** + **erotic**; What in TARNATION! You mean, the word **erotic** takes an **x** prefix, well I'll be DARNED. Knowing that, you should be able to find its *kinagram* somewhere within my text.

- x was first used to represent a kiss in a 1763 letter from Naturalist Gilbert White (according to OED research).
- Words that begin with EX are common but words that begin with X are not so common, the fewest number of any letter. And when it does start a word it is usually pronounced /z/.
- x is the third least frequently used letter in English (after 'q' and 'z') with a frequency of about 0.15% in words. About the same as finding love on a dating website.
- Many of the words that start with 'x' are of Greek origin, or standardised trademarks (XEROX) or acronyms (xtc).

- It is also used in abbreviations such as:

  XL = extra large or the labarum for 'Christ' in Xmas and Xian = Christian etc., or double XX or triple XXX denoting strong or extreme. And triple XXX cow brand in Western cowboy movies. Don't forget Four XXXX Beer OH no, I wouldn't!
- It is also used as a symbol such as in maths as the multiplication sign or on documents as answers to questions in boxes or x marks the spot on maps etc.
- In the past illiterate people would sign a document with an 'x' usually witnessed by a person of some authority that it was indeed the said person. Apparently, today illiterate or incapacitated persons are still able legally to do so provided it is witnessed, but can still be challenged in court.
- VEXT is an uncommon way to spell VEXED, a real EXCITOR. "Tis not fair to say, that sheep guts didst not lure such emotions from thy breast".- Shakespeare.

A baby on the way in San Francisco, my son's to carry on the family name via my grandson, started the trip of a lifetime. This year's trip of a lifetime in fact.

Babies don't say much that I can understand, so, after a week, we boarded the Queen Elizabeth for a 3 week cruise SF to New York via the Panama Canal. This also took in day visits to Mexico, Guatemala, Costa Rica, Aruba. We particularly liked Antigua in Guatemala. It has a nice feel to it with lots of Spanish Baroque architecture. It felt quite an affluent place, nice restaurants and quite a few tourists bedding in for long stays.

The canal itself was very interesting. There was very little space either side of our ship. We were tethered both sides, front and back to MULES. Their sole purpose was to keep us centred in the locks, otherwise we went under our own power.

We disembarked in New York and headed for La Guardia Airport. From there we caught a flight to Montreal then a connecting flight to Halifax, Nova Scotia. The last flight was in a Dash 8 turboprop.

Second family member picked us up and took us to his farm. A 100 acre semi wooded property with the nearest town of Tatamagouche. He intially suggested that as we would be on the North American continent it would be nice if we could visit him – and build him a deck around his farmhouse. I love a challenge

We had 3 weeks allocated to this visit, so next day we headed into town to get supplies. A deck I built at home started with a 50cm deep hole with a post concreted in. In Canada, the ground freezes down to 1 metre and the ice would push up the posts. "So you need to dig 5ft down (still imperial in Canadian building supplies) and put a plastic tube in then the post and each tube takes 9 bags of concrete."

"Is there another way?" we ask. After much stroking of beards we were shown a metal thing about a metre high with a large screw on one end and an adjustable bracket on t'other.

So we loaded up the truck with 10 of these things with our first load of timber (sorry, lumber). Screwing in the stirrups proved

character building. People later asked if some of them were crooked. I replied that a couple were straight.

Over the next couple of weeks we measured, sawed, screwed, hammered, cursed, adjusted and had many trips to the hardware store.

In this time a couple of Nova Scotian mates turned up with a strange looking BBQ and cooked an unidentified piece of meat in it. That was my first MOOSE steak. They also practiced their axe throwing as our host had to go to Sweden to represent Australia (or Japan as he is a pilot with a Japanese airline) in an international axe throwing competition.

So we were left on our own for the last week. We laid in supplies and harvested cherries and rhubarb from the property and did the fine finishing touches to our project.

All the mistakes are now hidden under a perfect looking deck. And we have recently had pictures of the first snow on the surface.

We left Canada and flew over to UK and caught up with more family and friends. First London then Nottingham. An old friend now lives in a country cottage and what a beautiful place that is. We visited the widow of a game-keeper on a huge estate, and she showed me damage to the bathroom window by the air rifle she used to shoot rabbits.

Then, the last leg of our journey, flying out of East Midlands airport to Malaga in Spain. Another of our family groups had moored their 42ft **KETCH** there after sailing from Sicily. We moved on board for a few days. Sailing to Gibraltar over 2 days. Rounding the Rock we hit a squall as we got close to the Atlantic.

We had a marina right next to the runway. The little ones amused themselves by identifying which airline was taking off. We had a stroll around to the airport, and the only road out of Gib is across the runway. So several times a day, the barriers go up, spikes come up in the road and another plane lands or takes off.

Getting on and off the boat was by way of a \*PASSARELLE which is French for PLANK about the width of an A4 page and 45° up. Challenging is the what springs to mind.

At the time of writing, they are in the Canary Islands preparing for an Atlantic crossing.

Scrabble in South Australia has had another big couple of months. The new Scrabble SA

committee was elected with Simon Walton taking over as President after our out-going president Oliver Jenner-O'Shea migrated to London. We welcomed Malcolm McAnulty & Suzanne Healey as first-time members of the committee along with a number of members continuing from the previous year. Thank you to all the committee members as well as other members who continue to help out in a variety of ways within the Scrabble community.

Several South Australians travelled to compete interstate and overseas during the recent period. At the Victorian Championships, Barry Jordan ended up 4th overall, with Adam Kretschmer 12th and the returning Dieter Jedamski 16th.

At the NSW Championships, Carmel Dodd was the highest placed South Aussie at 16th, with Barry Jordan and Rob Marotta also featuring.

At the Australian Masters and State Team Challenge in Canberra, Adam Kretschmer finished 11th in the Masters division. In the State Team Challenge, the SA team of Jane Taylor, Barry Jordan and Carmel Dodd finished 2nd overall. Carmel finished 3rd and Barry 5th in the individual standings.

Wendy Symes visited the UK and won Gdivision of a tournament earning herself a prize in Pound Sterling.

Adam Kretschmer competed in the WESPA Championship in Goa and finished 32nd overall, following up with 4th place in a side-event netting him a prize of Rupees.

In the WESPA Seniors Championship on the Gold Coast earlier this year, 10 players from SA competed with Jane Taylor the highest placed overall at 8th, followed by Carmell Dodd (14th), Antony Kimber (35th) and Francoise Finlayson (50th).

South Australia's Tournament Player of the Year for 2019 was narrowly won by Adam Kretschmer in the open rating band. Antony Kimber won the 1200-1500 band, Susan Roberts the 900-1200 band and Louisa Atsas won the under 900 band. Points for this competition are awarded at each SA tournament, Nationals and representative events (AM&STC, WESPAC). The bands are based on ratings at the start of the season.

The Adelaide Pub Scrabble Player of the Year has been won by Daniel Piechnick every year since its inception. However, this year we saluted a new winner for the 2019 season - Michael Cameron!

Looking to the future, South Australia will take on Victoria at the annual Border Challenge held in Horsham on the weekend of November 23-24. South Australian are aiming to extend their winning streak to 9 wins.

In the meantime, the new Scrabble Victoria Committee has been extremely busy, planning for a big 2020.

One of the first things that was done was to survey the player base, The results were very instructive and have provided the Committee with much guidance in the planning process.

There was large support for maintaining 2 player with clock games though it is notable there was a significant minority interest in variations, eg without clocks, speed Scrabble and even 4 player games.

Location and cost were two very important factors. The Committee is keen to explore

venues and events that features more areas outside the inner and Northern suburbs that came about as a result of the 600% increase in rental expense at Box Hill.

There was support for paying a little extra if it meant the venue and food on offer was attractive. There was a little support for better overall prize money but it was not as favored as what was mentioned previously.

Events for 2020 are slowly making their way to the Australian calendar: the Saturday Sessions returns and we have secured venues for our Generations comp and Essendon tournament. For the first time in Australia, we will be running a rated Match Play knock out comp and, whilst capped at 16 players, we are hoping it will attract some players who could not make it to a standard tournament format.

Growth in player base is a focus for us and we look forward to readers' support in helping us achieve this goal."

Becoming a member of a book club (1) has introduced me to titles and authors hitherto unknown. Next month we'll be discussing **KYLIE** (2) Tennant's *Ride On Stranger*; I had heard of her, but this is the first book of hers I've read. It won't be the last! Wikipedia lists 11 novels, one set of Short Stories, five books for children, five lots of plays, which, going by the titles, must be written for

**SCHOOLCHILDREN** (all one playable word!) (3), four biography and history books, and two books of literary criticism ... so I'll be busy! (Where has she been all my life??)

To quote from Kerryn Goldsworthy's Introduction to my A&R 1994 edition, page 9,

Ride On Stranger was Kylie Tennant's fourth novel, published in 1943 when, at the age of thirty-one, she had already acquired a reputation not only as a prize-winning novelist but also as a sharp-eyed social critic who was prepared to go to extraordinary lengths to gather material and experience for her fiction. To do this she took to the roads during the Depression with the itinerant unemployed, she lived with Aboriginal communities, and she once deliberately spent a month in jail."

Her social criticism had me crowing with laughter in buses, trains and trams (Light Rail), which is where I do most of my reading. And her sharp-eyed observation of scenery, rural and urban, especially of the Sydney I came to as a child, had me cooing with delight.

Chapter VII opens with a remarkably accurate account of the Royal Easter Show as I recall it then.

On page 59 she comments:

"They come back year after year. Their children come back when they are grown up to do the same thing, to suffer the same boredom, the mud, the grey rain, the biting wind or broiling heat, whichever happens in a particular year to accompany the smell of manure and hot fairy floss (4), the human **WAFTURES** of sweat, the blaring music, the screams of the sellers and the shift-shift of thousands of feet."

Aah, doesn't it take you back??

The heroine, Shannon, keeps moving on till the very end of the book, and she is worth following. She stays true to herself despite all the influences, quasi-religious and political, that come to bear on her life. I feel she must be very like her author ....

I know where there is a copy of her first novel, Tiburon. Loud cheers!



A couple of months ago Australia's Prime Minister, Scott Morrison travelled to the USA to visit their President, Donald Trump. Shortly afterwards another event took place that attracted rather less media coverage – the 2019 WESPA Championship in Goa, India.

This article briefly highlights the exploits of the top performing American and Australian player and some of the up and downs of Tournament Scrabble:

The format of the 2019 WESPA Championship was a 32 game tournament followed by a best of 7 game final the next day. Nigel Richards had an unassailable lead with a couple of games to go and was assured of a spot in the final, however the result of the round 32 clash between two American players, David Weigand and Jesse Day would determine his opponent. Weigand just played WHIRL at 3K for 32 points, tying the scores at 117 all.



This choice worked out badly for Weigand, but of course at the time he didn't know his opponent was holding **AEEHRST**. Day played **HALTERES** at O1 for 158 points and then proceeded to draw **AEIPS??**, following up with another bonus to clinch his spot in the final.

The final went down to the deciding 7th game. Richards gained the early ascendancy with the double-double bonus word **AMUSING**, but



played **AVOIDERS** at A8 for 167 points (**AVODIRES** scores 9 less points), effectively deciding the final in his favour. A triple-triple opened the door for Jesse one day but closed it the very next day!

Australia's top performing player at WESPAC (Russell Honeybun from WA) had his own share of ups and downs in India. The following graph, reminiscent of the chart of a cyclical stock listed on the Australian Securities Exchange shows the number of players he was ahead of after each round. Russell won



his first six games but then scored 1½ points from his next 9 games to drop back into midfield. An eight-game winning streak from rounds 22 – 29 catapulted Russell back up to 5th place, only ½ point away from 2nd with just 3 games to go. A narrow 14 point loss to Jesse Day in round 30 eliminated Russell from finals contention, however still he finished up a very creditable 9th outright.

The changing fortunes of tournament scrabble!
