CASPA LEVY

NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP FORMAT

A working group (Paul Richards, Victor Tung, John Hamilton, Barry Harridge and Carol Johnsen) met on several occasions (via Zoom) to discuss and recommend a format for future years. The group has produced new tournament software - Tightau (many thanks to Barry Harridge) which is still being "tweaked" (Queensland Championship) but will certainly allay the concerns of all players particularly with respect to resets and unevenness of standard of players in some instances. CASPA will decide and make a decision after these championships in August.

Tournament Roundup

The first of six tournaments of the quarter was the restricted by rating Beecroft Marathon, on 4th June. This would be the last ever Beecroft Marathon due to the sale of the Zetler home. The event first started back in 1993 as the Winter Masters in Ivor Zetler's Carlingford garage, and restarted after a four year break in 2000 as the Beecroft Olympic Marathon, eventually settling as the Beecroft Marathon and held every year since 2010.

Some reminiscing was done over the evening meal with stories of bygone days, notably Peter Shaw falling into the Carlingford fishpond and the following year through a chair. Peter also used to amuse us by his form guides on the event, making interesting reading nearly 30 years on.

This year's event was played as a 14 person, 13 game Round Robin. It went right down to the wire, as I (Bob Jackman) faced off against John Holgate to determine the winner in the final round after dinner. We were playing for pride as there wass no prizemoney in this event. As it happened, fatigue was the winner as on completion of the game it was found there were stray tiles on the floor which could have sent the result either way. We both agreed that John had won by four points which was fitting as he had won the inaugural event 30 years earlier. Rocky Sharma was one win behind in third place.

The next event to take place was the hastily organised No Frills 4, in the modern Lawson Room at the Revesby Workers Club. No Frills events are organised to fill voids in the Tournament Calendar as was the case this time. In A Division, three players tied on 6 wins out of 8 games, separated only by spread. In finishing order they were Tony Hunt, John Holgate and Garth Van Vliet. In B Division, Dorothy Fields with 6 wins prevailed over Norma Tracey and Natalie Tadday, both with five wins.

The next rated event was in mid week in mid July, the Out in the Open Open organised by Tony Hunt. Tony himself was the winner going undefeated, with Margaret Berliner and Therese Nicholls also finishing in the placings.

The following weekend, on 16th July, saw the annual Wollongong WORDS club round robin take place. 41 players made the trip, so 5 groups of 8 played 7 games. A data entry glitch caused only the A section to be drawn as a Round Robin, necessitating Swiss draws for the other 4 Divisions. This situation was successfully navigated, with the end result being something close to a Round Robin for all groups.

The Divisional winners were Rod Talbot, A Division (all 7 wins), Steven Savona, B Division (5 wins), John Barker, C Division (5 wins), Vincent Nguyen from ACT, D Division (5 wins) and youth player Vinh Nguyen, E Division (6 wins). The high word of the day was Bob Jackman's 149 for **RETRIEVE**, while the high game of 549 was scored by Bob's victim, Noel Barrett, in a different game

A week later the two-day Winter Masters took place in the Revesby Workers Club. The Winter Challenge was slated to take place as a parallel event, but lack of entries caused the

Three groups of 12 played 8 games, capably directed by John Hamilton. It was pleasing to see three novices taking part, from Lane Cove and Waverley Clubs. A Division was won by Bob Jackman on spread from Tony Hunt, both on 6 wins. In B Division Sharon Sorensen finished one win clear of Norma Tracey while in C Division Josie Mally and Stephen Morrow both finished on 6 wins. Norma Tracey score the high word of the day with **SQUARER** for 138.

This statement about Scrabble NSW's position with the expurgated word source has been placed on our website:

Scrabble New South Wales, by majority committee vote in 2020, decided to reject CSW21, the expurgated version of CSW19, and continue to use CSW19 for tournaments organised by the NSW Committee. We believe that at the professional level, our game should be played with a pure lexicon, free from

If you can't get to tournaments, and enjoy the thought of playing similarly rated players from anywhere in Australia, this is for you. interference from corporate organisations. As a result of this decision we do not align with WESPA, who now refuse to rate tournaments unless they are played to the expurgated lexicon. Instead we endorse WordGamers International who will rate all major events played with an unexpurgated word source, and who have stated they will develop an alternative player lexicon in consultation with supporting organisations and players.

Scrabble New South Wales has no objection to it's affiliated clubs adopting CSW21 for club play, and have no objection to club tournaments being organised to play to CSW21. We do however require that tournament organisers adopting CSW21 for their event stipulate that in their tournament flyer.

Scrabble New South Wales will be revisiting the dictionary issue at the 2022 Annual General Meeting in October when players will be given the opportunity to state their personal preference.

60 Ways to Lose 1 Game of Scrabble Bob Jackman

This is part 1 of a two-part listing of 60 ways to lose a game of Scrabble. This part lists ways to lose during general play, while Part 2 in the next issue will list ways to lose during the endgame. Most of these ways to lose are derived from personal experience gained from losing well over 2000 games:

- 1. Playing a doubtful word when a safer alternative is available
- 2. Not carefully checking opponent's score for move
- 3. Not checking score for own move in case of underscoring
- Writing down score for move without checking validity of opponent's play
- Not thoroughly checking validity of own move
- 6. Not tile-tracking correctly
- 7. Not tile-tracking continuously through game
- 8. Not challenging when there is any doubt
- **9.** Not spending enough time looking for a probable bingo
- **10.** Spending too much time looking for an improbable bingo
- **11.** Not going with first hunch, which is usually correct
- **12.** Not studying rack fully after opponent has played wrong word, before challenging
- **13.** Not minimising opponent's score on next move, after challenging
- 14. Not searching exhaustively for place to lay bonus word
- **15.** Not considering extensions of words on board
- 16. Not considering alternative bingos
- **17.** Not changing when situation seems hopeless
- **18.** Pluralising words ending in ING when not sure of meaning
- **19.** Not blocking potentially high scoring play with unseen heavy letter
- 20. Making an opening after challenging off incorrect word

- 21. Not searching thoroughly for multiple overlaps
- 22. Not confusing spelling of an unusual word
- 23. Not risking pluralising six letter word for bingo
- 24. Not playing a risky word when starting the game
- 25. Not having adequate stationery to enable retracking if necessary
- **26.** By incorrectly identifying the blank on the result slip
- 27. By mistracking the blank
- **28.** By accidentally setting up an opening on a closed board when ahead
- 29. By not changing dreck when there are good tiles to come
- 30. Not insuring against prospect of picking Q

Seniors World Championship

Sydney 1 to 3 November 2022

This event has been played in various countries ~ Thailand, Malaysia, New Zealand, and Australia. The most recent event was held in 2019 on the Gold Coast. It was planned for Malta in April 2020. Sadly, this was one of the first casualties of COVID.

Given that most of the older players in the world are from Australia and New Zealand (plus UK, and to a lesser extent, India) it makes sense to organise this again in Australia. The predominant dictionary used in these two countries is CSW19, so we will remain with that. It will be free challenge, which makes it easier to adapt, for anyone who is playing a different dictionary, such as TWL or CSW21. Esther Perrins (Aust) was the most recent Seniors Champion. Howard Warner (NZ) has clinched multiple titles. Joanne Craig (Aust/NZ) Tony Sim (Singapore) and Odette Rio (Philippines) are other Seniors Champions.

Dianne Ward (Aust) also had her moment of glory, winning the first trial event, in Thailand, when we were deciding whether a Seniors event was viable. There were 133 players competing in the 2019 event, so it is certainly worth organising.

Hopefully, we can welcome most "senior" players to this event (anyone turning 55 this year, or older.) Having age groups prizes makes it exciting for everyone!

Traveller's Tales

We were invited to accompany friends on a 10 day working visit to Lord **HOWE** Island in May. We had the use of a house and a car. Just the airfares.

An uneventful 3 hour flight got us onto the island after a windy buffeted landing which is normal.

LHI has a speed limit of 20kph everywhere, which most people adhere to. There are lots of bikes, some owned by the locals and others for hire out to visitors.

We were warned that food is expensive on the island and advised to take some staples with us. We chose to take our chances and adapt rather than load our luggage up with Vegemite and peanut butter.

The house we stayed in had resident chooks which supplied a few eggs a day. Also a large banana patch which yielded bunches of 40 or 50 very green fruit. We learned that keeping a few on the kitchen bench took care of our needs on a daily basis. We also had a supply of avocados from the tree in the front yard.

A prominent member of the local community who had ties to our friends also supplied us with a daily loaf of sourdough bread.

There are a few restaurants on the island but they have to operate in a different way to those on the West Island (Mainland Australia). Due to availability issues, the menu has to change on a daily basis. We found a wonderful pumpkin soup for lunch one day. Went back the next day and it was a slightly different soup and the serving was not as big. Fish is obviously a prominent main course

The wildlife is unique. Everywhere there were **wooDHENS** (HOEDOWNS) which are related to, and even look like, miniature **KIWIS**. These were threatened at one stage but the eradication of rats and cats and other introduced animals means they have a much better chance of surviving as a species. They all seemed to have a leg tag, so the numbers are being monitored.

Then there are the **BOOBIES** which our host managed to bring in close to us out on the hilly end of the island.

Most locals have more than one job. The guy who runs the "service station" is also the

plane refueller, local mechanic, runway maintenance. The garbage tip operates a couple of days a week. Recycling is very structured, the many glass bottles generated are ground up, mixed with other waste and used to repair roads.

You cannot go and live on the island unless you were born there or marry someone who was born there.

As our friends were also musicians they decided to stage a concert for the locals in the hall atached to our digs. By a sheer coincidence, there happened to be a regular visitor to the island who was a violinist with the Sydney Symphony and mentoring a resident of the island on violin. So with other residents and visitors we were able to stage a decent program, including music from the principal of the school and a working visa visitor from Sweden and also a banjo player.

One night we watched the Island Trader dock with supplies. The ship spent quite a time outside the reef, waiting for the high tide. The ship does a regular run from Port Macquarie with provisions for the locals, stock for the few shops, fuel for vehicles and for aircraft plus anything else which is too bulky or heavy to carry by plane.

The island boasts a decent sized solar array with a battery the size of a double decker bus which supplements the diesel generator.

Tourism is the major income for the island so it has taken quite a hit during the pandemic, but slowly recovering now that restrictions are being lifted. We had great time, and even learnt to be a bit off the grid.
