WESPA Championship

What an exciting time it was when, in Las Vegas in July, David Eldar defeated Harshan Lambadasuriya of England to become the 2023 WESPA Champion on the final day in the play-off (best of 7 games) between 1st & 2nd of the 132 players who participated. It went down to the wire. This is the second time David has won the title, the first was in 2017 and it was, once again, defeating Harshan in the best of five games then.

Vale Chris May

Edward Okulicz

In August 2023, the Australian Scrabble Community lost one of its greatest players, Chris May, who passed away due to complications from bowel cancer at just 39 years of age.

His Scrabble career started at the Balmain Scrabble Club in 1999. The professionalism with which he carried himself during games was as remarked-upon as his aptitude. He made his tournament debut in September 1999, and in his first year improved his national ranking from 469 to 44. He entered the top 10 in 2003 and never looked back. He went on to be a fixture in the top 10 of the world rankings too, and always played like it.

He won two Australian Championships, State Championships in four states and took home trophies at major titles consistently. He represented Australia with great distinction at multiple World Championships and team events such as the Trans Tasman Challenge and the Alchemist Cup/Causeway Challenge where he was three times part of a winning Australian team.

All the while, he excelled in other parts of life. He completed a dual degree in Arts and Law and his acuity in these fields was the same as in Scrabble. Both an accomplished musician and researcher, he earned a PhD from Oxford University, studying the music of Arvo Pärt. He played a number of other board games, was a keen squash player, and was an expert on cricket and tennis. He travelled extensively and intrepidly – including a trip to North Korea – and was as worldly as he was academic.

Chris continued to play Scrabble at a high level even after his diagnosis. His last major title came at the 2022 NSW Championships – seemingly nothing could affect his intellectual firepower. He loved the game and its community, counting many of us as personal friends, and contributed greatly to the organisational aspect of the game. He served on the NSW Committee for several years and was the driving force behind the creation of the WESPA Rules used in international tournaments.

Chris is survived by his wife Ksenia and daughter Natasha. When you remember him, keep them in your thoughts too. May we all learn from Chris's sterling example – try hard, work meticulously, and always look to do better.

WESPA Champs

Some insights from David Eldar on the WESPA Championship and his games.

The astonishing heatwave I faced upon exiting the airport was a sore reminder of why I don't ever spend too long in Vegas (in my heyday, I spent months living here in a house with 10 bros, and have visited a few times since). I am certainly a fan of Vegas - there are lots of great ways to entertain yourself, the food is of the highest level and I wish there was more time to go and see the exceptional shows that are on every night.

Jetlag is a killer - I couldn't stay up past 6pm and when I woke up it was 3am, so I ordered a boatload of fat American food to my door as usual forgetting how portion sizing works in America and ending up with enough food for 3 moderately sized Scrabble players.

WESPA Championship Games

Play took place in a giant ballroom which would have probably been classy in the 1970's but not now. The players barely filled the space which was at times good, but also a reminder of how far things have sunk for competitive Scrabble since I started playing. Certainly when this event was in the Riviera casino, there was a much bigger showing.

On Day 1 ended up with 6-2 (the last two games of the day). Olatunde Oduwale (Nigeria) dropped **ONA*** against me, and I rode to a 6-0 start, before dropping to Henry and another frustrating loss to Wellington Jighere (Nigeria). Had a 600 margin win against Qatari player Maria Christine Caoile.

The regrets began on Day 2. Against Kevin Fraley (USA), I played an atrocious preendgame.

Here, what I need to do is score enough over two turns to prevent his bingo winning. Instead, what I did is exactly opposite that, draining my clock and settling on some pathetic equity play (I saw a lot of bingos to draw with **CEVT**), which loses to getting outscored or refished on, both consequences which I had considered. Simply **VOX**, or even blocking with **VEXT** would perform much better. **VOX** of course would have won this game comfortably, as well as several other plays such as **WOVE** and **WIN**. This is a huge mistake, and in the end I lost by 5 points - the amount of points lost on my annoying challenge of **EGRESSED** - perhaps if I looked for **SLEDGERS** I would have left that alone, but I couldn't be certain it was valid.

A bad game against Joshua Castellano (Canada) was riddled with mistakes, but a lucky break against Russell Honeybun (Australia) as he let me get away with the atrocious **ALVEATE***. I tilted against Alec Sjoholm (USA), playing too fast, opening -**OUB/AIRE**, missing **OUREBI**, which is a 10 point error and then lost the game.

Against Anand Bharadwaj I randomly missed **ENTRYIST** and later **REDSHIFT** with a blank, after using way too much time early.

Against Thacha Kooiwrat (Thailand) I drew well and was cruising to an easy victory *UNTIL I DON'T* and the pre-endgame got tricky. I made a mistake and then emotionally checked out of the game. Even then, I still just had to *LOOK*, because it turns out all I had to do to win was *TO PLAY OUT AND I MISSED IT*. Missing an outplay is a new one for me -I'm legitimately not sure the last time I lost a game like that.

I play like garbage against Tony Leah already having written myself off for the tournament.

I played fast and bad up to this point, randomly dropping 10 or 20 points of equity needlessly in a blur. After **EH** I was so bereft, I stared at this rack for ages ruing his block of **KEMBOS** and wondering how the hell I'm supposed to win this game. Then it came to me in a flash – the valid **SOKEMEN!** Tony cracked up when I played my move. What on earth was I thinking about!? Somehow he missed his fish and I go on to win this miracle game.

Double blanked again against Alec Sjoholm, I lose this heartbreaker when I had an easy win. I saw EANED, then CREEDAL. I remembered my game with Harshan - just take the 40 points. But these situations are very different and I was compensating for the wrong thing, another horrendous pre- endgame play failing to block the obvious bingo line. I see LEANED a second after I play the clock and

sink through to the bottom of the Titanic when Alec slaps down **GIDDIEST**. I had feebly reasoned at least there was an **I** in the bag for me to draw and win with (he did in fact draw said **I**).

Against David Wiegand (USA), I miss **COZENER** for over 100 points after looking for minutes, then draw **DOGGIEST** onto my rack and simply *CANNOT* place it as a word anywhere in my memory. **DOGGIER** particularly sounds phoney. I can't decide and make some terrible inferior play, a 40 point punt. As soon as I hit the clock I know it's valid, obviously. Somehow I win anyway.

Learning the 9s has really shifted my skill level and study regime in a much grosser way than I thought it would. **AORN** I think I have about a quarter of the 9s in my cardbox and I just don't feel like I'm anywhere near done with that project, and expect it to take at least 2-3 more years to completion. That said, that's what it takes to learn them, and I want to know them. Safe to say also without two elite players moving to Melbourne, I would never have became this good.

ACT

Annual Elections

New South Wales

Scrabble NSW lost two of its longtime players during the quarter. Nonie English passed away quietly in early June after a short illness, having played continuously from 1998 through to 2018.

Chris May lost his battle with cancer in early August. Despite the burden of treatment, Chris made it to Melbourne to compete in the Nationals one last time this year. He had previously won the Nationals in 2011 in Canberra and again in Sydney in 2021. He first played as a teenager at the Baulkham Hills Tournament in 1999 and from then on it was all uphill, as he rose to be third ranked player in the world at one stage.

His list of other Scrabble achievements are too numerous to include here, but include having won a British Championship while studying at Oxford and been a member of the thrice victorious Australian Team in the Malaysian Causeway Challenge. During his illness, Chris married his partner Ksenia and just prior to his passing became the proud father of Natasha.

Masters and State Challenge

Scrabble NSW looks forward to hosting the Australian Masters and State Challenge at the Revesby Workers Club in early September. Onlookers can check our website for progressive results as the tournament unfolds.

Women should take note of the Australian Women's Championship, to take place on Australia Day at the prestigious Bankstown Sports Club, as a lead up to the City of Sydney Masters on the following two days at the same venue.

Tournament Roundup

Six tournaments were played during the quarter with the first being the Central Coast

nearly Winter Tournament in late May. 28 players were split into three Divisions with Bob Jackman, John Linney and Krystyna Batten being the Divisional winners, all with 7 wins. Youth player Vinh Nguyen achieved the high word of the day with 107 for **WAITERS**. The tournament also saw to the return to directing of George Khamis.

Next up was Sydney's first ever Northern Beaches event held at the new Zetler residence in Newport. Thirteen people made the trip north, with the person travelling the furthest in Noel Barrett (from Goulburn) taking out the honours in only losing two of his 10 games. Liz Jackman achieved high word with **STRAINED** for 122.

Two weeks letter we ventured south to Wollongong, where 40 players were split into 5 Divisions for a Round robin of 7 games. Joanne Craig, Lexie Neale, Marion Miller, Julie Banister and Vinh Nguyen were the Divisional winners. Joanne also achieved high game score with 600. At this tournament we also paid tribute to long term stalwart of the Wollongong Words Club Keith Bioletti who passed away earlier in the year.

The major event for the guarter was the Winter Masters on the weekend of 15th and 16th July. This event was run by Scrabble NSW as a stand alone event as in the early years, due to marked reduction in interest in the sister event the Winter Challenge. This year's Masters event belonged to Rod Talbot as he powered to a 17 out of 18 game win, winning his first 13 games on the trot picking up rating 133 points in the process. John Holgate and Bob Jackman occupied the minor placings, in preparation for their upcoming trip to Las Vegas for the Word Championships. Graeme Lock Lee, also Vegas-bound, found some of the limelight by notching both high game of 577 and high word of **STOCKADE** for 183 in the same game. He later found out that **STOCKADE** had been underscored by 20, bring the actual score to 203.

The last tournament for the quarter was the WYC fundraiser organised by junior Vinh Nguyen under the guidance of Tony Hunt. 24 players took part, including six new juniors from the Cabramatta area. Tony won the A Division narrowly over Garth van Vliet, while Devorah Ullman of Waverley Club took out the honours in B Division. Tony also achieved a high game of 689 which was later found to be overscored by 14 points.

Matchplay Progress

The Under 1300 Matchplay has progressed to the stage where 3 of the 4 Round 1 matches have been decided. Peter Griffiths, Sharon Sorensen and Steven Savona have all won through to the semifinals, with paired to next play each other in a best of 9.

In the Over 1300 Matchplay, Rael Hayman Joanne Craig and Greg Pinchbeck won their Round 1 clashes. Joanne has already progressed to the final by beating Greg Pinchbeck in their semifinal.

Victorian Championship and the Tight Australian Format

This year's Victorian Championship was a fascinating event to observe, especially in the way everything ended up. The use of a Tight Australian Draw for the second year in a row has yielded valuable information when it comes to big event draw determination and I wanted to take the opportunity to share that with a wider audience.

For many a year, post-Nationals conversations tended to include discussion of how the draw can impact the outcome of the event, especially as the end of the event is reached. Resets done mid-event have meant that the top part of the field are likely to have played each other and we've ended up with first versus tenth in the final round, with second playing ninth or somesuch.

Many concepts were tried – and in last year's Victorian, the first iteration of what would be called a Tight Australian Draw was implemented. By the time, the 2023 Nationals came, a different iteration had been considered and applied.

The concept of Tight Australian, in very much a lay sense, is to try to guarantee a fairness in the draw; if you are doing well, you should always be playing people at the same level as you rather than continuing to play down the rest of the draw to avoid repeats. Equally, if you are not doing so well, the same concept applies except you are avoiding higher positioned players simply to avoid repeats.

I was fortunate to have a copy of the original Tight Australian and it has one advantage over later versions; repeats are unlimited. This is an advantage, especially around the top of the ladder: ideally, if you have a highly ranked player running away with the event, you want their draw to still be with top performing players as it is likely to bring them back to the field.

Which leads us to this year... how did everything go? This year's Victorian was held at The Olympic Hotel in Preston – the same venue as the 2022 AMSTC. The upstairs room was comfortable enough for 40 players (and could go to more), making it an ideal venue for an event like the Victorian.

Thirty eight players joined us for the King's Birthday weekend and played 18 games. Ten

games on day one and eight on the final day. It attracted players from NSW, Queensland, SA, and New Zealand in addition to a healthy number of local players. Players had access to food nearby for lunch, and were kept refreshed with continuous tea, coffee, and biscuits.

The field was strong with most of the top Victorian players in attendance (though the 2022 Champion had moved to the USA in the meantime) and, was therefore, a good test for how applicable the original Tight Australian draw worked (or didn't).

So... how did it go?

We had a repeat as early as Game 4 – repeats are expected but not this early!! Upon further inspection, this was the very definition of an extraordinary occurrence. Two players from the round one draw had different results in their next two and ended up playing each other very soon after.

This outlier aside, by the end of the tournament a pattern had emerged at the top.

Those who ended up top 3 - David Eldar, Edward Okulicz, and Andrew Fisher – had multiple repeats against different top level opponents. In this context, David's phenomenal effort of 16-2 was huge... and a precursor, possibly, of how well he would do in Las Vegas. His 16-2 record included 4 games against Edward (who came 2nd), 3 games against Andrew (who came 3rd), 3 against Naween, 2 against Trevor, and 2 against Geoff Wright. His win was very well deserved. So far so good then? Not necessarily. The same effect that was happening at the top also played out at the other end of the ladder. Those who finished closer to the bottom had multiple repeats as well, and the reaction to this is not necessarily going to be the same as from those at the top.

What to make of all this, then? Is it worth continuing with... for me, the answer is yes. Using a draw format that can lead to the type of games David had to face to win a premier event should be continued with... but how to look at what happened at the other end of the ladder.

What happened at either end of the table occurred because the player rating make up resembled a bell curve. But there is a far greater number of players ranked below 1000 than there are above 1700 so that shouldn't be happening.

The draw format would not be as much of an issue if the event was made attractive to get more players, especially at lower ratings.

The need to attract more players has never been more crucial, especially with the challenges over the past 3 years. Finding ways to get more in will mean we can continue to run premier events like the Victorian and grow as an organization at the same time.

The 2021 Expurgation

When I was in grade five (primary school), the pedagogy started to focus on the meanings of words. We all had to have the Devil's playbook – the dictionary. We were also quizzed on our understanding of word meanings.

I only remember one of my failures in that I was asked to provide the meaning of **BIBLIOGRAPHY** and I didn't know what the word meant. Asked to guess I posited that it meant "study of the Bible." Our teacher, Mrs Searle, reprimanded a boy in our class for using the dictionary to look up the meaning of "rude" words. The boy had taken great delight in - complete with accompanying snickers describing the meaning of FART but he was not brave enough to look up some of the more salty ones. I am sure Mrs Searle would be appalled by some of the words we can use in competitive Scrabble play. In fact whole groups of people seemed worried about words used off and on the Scrabble board.

With the constant evolution of language, personal preferences and changing contexts, the "right" word rarely exists. However, understanding which words may be more appropriate than others in certain situations can reinforce our values of diversity, equity and inclusion while inviting others into our work. Most importantly, when we make thoughtful word choices, we can be part of creating a more inclusive environment

The National Recreation and Park Association is just one of a number of organisations in the USA that are explicitly concerned about the words that we use. The University of Washington has its *Equitable Language Guide*. The Governor's Interagency Council on Health Disparities produced their *Equity Language Guide* 6 December, 2018. American Psychological Association published their *Inclusive Language Guidelines* in 2021. The recent push by the corporate owners of Scrabble to remove "hate speech" seems just another example of this heightened awareness. Some in the competitive Scrabble community see this as an attempt to control us, much like the Ministry of Truth in George Orwell's 1984. In the novel, the Ministry of Truth is involved with news media, entertainment, the fine arts and educational books. Its purpose is to rewrite history to change the facts to fit Party doctrine for propaganda effect. Mattel and Hasbro state that their changes are merely to fit with the "family friendly" nature of the game.

Some players may not be aware of previous attempts to make recreational materials more family friendly. Thomas Bowdler, an English physician, created *The Family Shakespeare*, an expurgated edition of William Shakespeare's plays edited by his sister Henrietta Maria Bowdler. They sought a version they saw as more appropriate than the original for 19th century women and children. The term "BOWDLERISE" or "BOWDLERIZE" links the name with expurgation or omission of elements deemed unsuited to children, in literature and films and on television.

Recent attempts to make other books more acceptable to modern audiences have not met with much support. In 2023 new versions of Roald Dahl's books were published by Puffin Books to remove language deemed "inappropriate". Puffin had hired "sensitivity readers" to go over his texts to make sure the books could "continue to be enjoyed by all today". This was branded "absurd censorship" by author Sir Salman Rushdie. And even UK Prime Minister Rishi Sunak's spokesperson said: "When it comes to our rich and varied literary heritage, the PM agrees with the BFG that you shouldn't 'gobblefunk'* around with words."

Ian Fleming Publications Ltd – the company that retains literary rights to James Bond series about 007, the iconic British secret service agent – commissioned a sensitivity review that will see some racially offensive language and outdated stereotypes removed from the works written by the company's namesake. Racial slurs toward black people will be removed but depictions of other ethnic minorities, such as a Korean character called "Oddjob" in *Goldfinger*, the seventh book, will This day is published, in 10 vols. royal 18mo, price 31. 3s. boards, THE FAMILY SHAKSPEARE: in which nothing is added to the original Text: but those words and expressions are omitted which cannot with propriety be read aloud in a Family. remain. According to *The Telegraph*, the new April 2023 editions will be published alongside an accompanying disclaimer that reads: "This book was written at a time when terms and attitudes which might be considered offensive by modern readers were commonplace." This disclaimer mirrors those put in place by streaming services like Disney+, which added warnings before content with racist depictions such as *The Jungle Book*.

George Packer, writing in the April 2023 edition of The Atlantic, in an article entitled "The Moral Case Against Euphemism -Banning words won't make the world more just" notes the proliferation of Equitylanguage guides among some of America's leading institutions, particularly nonprofits. The words these guides recommend or reject are sometimes exactly the same, justified in nearly identical language. This is because most of the guides draw on the same sources from activist organizations. Although the guides refer to language "evolving," these changes are a revolution from above. They haven't emerged organically from the shifting linguistic habits of large numbers of people. They are handed down in communiqués written by obscure "experts" who purport to speak for vaguely defined "communities," remaining unanswerable to a public that's being morally coerced. He notes:

The rationale for equity language guides is hard to fault. They seek a world without

oppression and injustice. Because achieving this goal is beyond anyone's power, they turn to what can be controlled and try to purge language until it leaves no one out and can't harm those who already suffer. Avoiding slurs, calling attention to inadvertent insults, and speaking to people with dignity are essential things in any decent society ... The guides follow the grammar of Puritan preaching to the last clause. Once you have embarked on this expedition, you can't stop at Oriental or thug, because that would leave far too much evil at large. So you take off in hot pursuit of gentrification and legal resident, food stamps and gun control, until the last sin is hunted down and made right which can never happen in a fallen world. (page12)

PEN America (an association for poets, playwrights, editors, essayists, and novelists) notes that a number of legislators are even moving to stifle discussion of certain topics. PEN note in their publication *Educational Gag Orders: Legislative Restrictions on the Freedom to Read, Learn, and Teach* that between January and September 2021, 24 legislatures across the United States introduced 54 separate bills intended to restrict teaching and training in K-12 schools, higher education, and state agencies and institutions. The majority of these bills target discussions of race, racism, gender, and American history, banning a series of "prohibited" or "divisive" concepts for teachers and trainers operating in K-12 schools, public universities, and workplace settings. These bills appear designed to impose government dictates on teaching and learning. Collectively, these bills are illiberal in their attempt to legislate that certain ideas and concepts be out of bounds, even, in many cases, in college classrooms among adults.

Perhaps an echo of **COMSTOCKERY** - in 1873. Thomas Anthony Comstock created the New York Society for the Suppression of Vice, an institution dedicated to moral supervision of the American public. Later that year. Comstock successfully influenced the United States Congress to pass the Comstock Laws. which made illegal the delivery by U.S. mail, or by other modes of transportation, of "obscene, lewd, or lascivious" material, as well as prohibiting any methods of production or publication of information pertaining to the procurement of abortion, the prevention of conception and the prevention of venereal disease. Some of Comstock's ideas of what were "obscene, lewd, or lascivious" could be seen by many modern Westerners as quite broad; during his time of greatest power, some anatomy textbooks were prohibited from being sent to medical students by the United States Postal Service.

But back to the expurgation of the Scrabble word list. Nick Ascroft from New Zealand has

written on the subject (see his two articles from December 2012 on Newsroom.co.nz) and is not supportive. He outlines the various contradictions and omissions to the expurgation list. He concludes:

To be sure you don't get the wrong end of the stick, especially if you work for Mattel, my point is not that these words should have been cut from the Scrabble dictionary, but that attempting to remove the offence from the English language is a Sisyphean task. Scrabble is a dictionarybased game. Proper nouns and words with punctuation in them are not allowed. These are easy to define. Slur words are not. Dictionaries do not signal them in any consistent way.

So will the competitive Scrabble community in Australia heed the corporate edict on acceptable words that now is WESPA validated? I remember when we had play with either American (OSPD) or UK words (Chambers) and the great coming together of the eagle and the lion in the gryphon word list (or **GRIFFIN** or **GRYFON**). The move to Collins was also fraught with controversy (particularly with respect to some of the word definitions in the Official Dictionary). I am not the only player to mourn the loss of pH* from Scrabble play but coped and moved on. So now, should the 2021 expurgated word list become the tournament norm, I will only look for places to play BOA (or OBA or BAO) and ZEL instead of the other forbidden anagrams.
